John Phillips – So we take a point on earth and draw a line vertically into infinity. We also draw a line horizontally into infinity—"so far hath He removed our sins from us." There is a point on this planet where those two infinite lines intersect—the point is Calvary! We draw all our lines from the cross. The upright of the cross, driven like a stake into the ground, is where we begin our vertical line. We extend it up into infinity. The crossbar of the tree, flung wide as though to embrace the world, is where we begin our horizontal line into infinity. That is how the Lord measures His mercy—in terms of the cross.



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
