#### Jonah's Running—His Defiance (Jonah 1)

#### Introduction:

The book of Jonah is narrative of *rescue*—it is the passionate pursuit of a loving and gracious God. In this narrative, we see God pursuing a prophet, pagan sailors, and the people of Nineveh.

Jonah displays key characteristics that the believer should strive, by God's grace, to <u>refrain</u> from displaying in their own Christian walk.

In God's pursuit, we see His mercy. With each person that He is pursuing, we can see differing heart attitudes—different dispositions of rebellion against God.

In this narrative, we see characteristics of our magnificent God on full display as He pursues His wayward prophet.

Warren Wiersbe – The Book of Jonah is about the will of God and how we respond to it. It's also about the love of God and how we share it with others.

### I. The clarity of God's <u>Command</u> (v. 1-2)

Nineveh was the capital of the Assyrian Empire which would be modern day Iraq. It was Israel's worst enemy at this time.

II. The reality of God's \_\_\_\_\_ (v. 3)

It is important to see that **Jonah is living as a practical atheist**. He knows the truth about God, but he is living contrary to that truth. He knows that God is everywhere present, but he is living as if he can run from God.

A question that I would like for us to meditate upon is, "What is your Nineveh?"

Q: What is the command that is most difficult for you to hear?

Q: What commands of God cause you to panic or feel stressed?

Q: Which commands prompt you to say, "Anything but that Lord!"?

Q: What assignments do you find yourselves digging your heals in and refusing to obey?

**Proverbs 16:33** The lot is cast into the lap; but the whole disposing thereof *is* of the LORD.

Again, just as with Jonah, we need to keep in mind that every aspect of God's actions are rooted in love. He is mercifully pursuing His disobedient creation, seeking to rescue them from their miserable condition of **dead faith**. They are "dead in their trespasses and sins," separated from a holy and righteous God.

<u>Ephesians 2:4-5</u> BUT God, Who is rich in mercy, for His great love wherewith He loved us, Even when we were dead in sins, hath quickened us together with Christ, (by grace ye are saved;)

Through no effort of Jonah, God brought about good. In Jonah's wake, God was leaving a trail of transformed souls.

V. The Display of God's \_\_\_\_\_ (v. 17)

Despite Jonah's defiance against the direct commandment of God, God is still patient with Him, pursuing Him, seeking to rescue him.

Up to this point, Jonah is still unmoved in his rebellion against God. He is still unbroken and unrepentant in his sin.
